
Honoring a Fallen Police Officer Hillsboro Police Honor Guard Members Travel to New York City

Late on the evening of January 2, Hillsboro Police Department Honor Guard members Officer Justin Hubbenette and Officer Eric

Russell boarded a JetBlue flight bound for New York City. Their mission was a somber one: to pay tribute fallen NYPD Officer to Wenjian Liu, who was senselessly assassinated with his partner, Officer Rafael Ramos, as they sat in their patrol car on December 20, 2014. Officer Hubbenette and Officer Russell joined over 20 other officers from Oregon on this journey to our nation's largest city.

The two officers joined tens of thousands of other police officers from across the United States and Canada in honoring Officer Liu's service and sacrifice at his public memorial service on January 4. In a true display of the



notion that there are no borders in the policing family, the Oregon contingent formed up with members of the Toronto Police Service

and Ottawa Police Service to help line the procession route as Officer Liu's casket was brought past. They reported the feeling of camaraderie among police forces from around North America was impressive, and that everywhere they went they were greeted with gratitude by members of the NYPD and community alike.

They both described their experience as an overwhelming honor and a privilege to represent the Hillsboro Police Department in New York City in saying farewell to a fallen hero.

Officer Hubbenette and Officer Russell spent a considerable amount of time with members of the 106th Precinct of the NYPD, where they made many friendships that are likely to last for years to come. The officers were also able to pay their respects at the World Trade Center site, where so many thousands of people lost their lives in the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. Officer Hubbenette described it as a humbling and sobering experience to walk the ground where so many of their fellow first responders gave their lives so that others might live.

You approach an intersection wanting to make a left turn against a solid red light. You think to yourself, "Hmmmm, uhhhhh, can I do it?" C'mon, I know many of you have pondered this very question! The *answer* it depends.

First, to be clear, this article is <u>not</u> meant to address left turns from a solely designated left turn lane, but rather from a regular travel lane.

One to One - YES!

Most of you likely know you can make a left turn on a red when you're traveling from a one-way street to another one-way street; that of course after having made a complete stop and yielding to traffic from your right.

Two to One - YES!

You may also make that same turn on a red light when traveling from a two-way street to a one-way street. Again, after that complete stop, be sure to yield to traffic from your right.

One to Two / Two to Two - NO!

You may <u>not</u> turn left on a red after a complete stop when traveling from a one-way to a twoway street or a two-way to a two-way.

Hillsboro Police Patrol and Cadets Conduct Traffic Safety Details

Hillsboro Police Cadets teamed up with patrol officers to conduct traffic details focusing on pedestrian safety around two Hillsboro schools. This safety campaign was designed to educate and encourage people to obey traffic laws and to watch for pedestrians utilizing marked and unmarked crosswalks.

With three cadets acting as pedestrian decoys and four patrol officers responding to violations, the team was able to make 35 stops, issuing 23 warnings and 12 citations. The primary violations enforced were speed, fail to yield to a pedestrian in a crosswalk and cell phone use while driving. The effort brought visibility to high traffic areas and had a positive residual effect on overall traffic safety.

How to Lose Your Home with One Easy Phone Call

First of all, you may be behind a payment or two and the



payment or two and the lender is calling you daily and telling you that you are in jeopardy of losing your home...or, there may have already been a Notice of Default posted on the front of your house. You may be ashamed, embarrassed, scared, and, as many

people are facing this situation, desperate.

Then you see a sign on a telephone pole "We buy Houses" or maybe a flyer in a Mercado or other Spanish owned business advertising help for people just like you.

And you call.

The people at the other end are waiting for someone just like you. They especially like to prey on more vulnerable people. Perhaps you are a senior citizen, or, perhaps English is not your first language. The scammers are very good at what they do. They often show up very quickly and may have paperwork they want you to sign. They tell you not to worry. They tell you they will take care of your mortgage. They are very warm and convincing or maybe they take this approach..."Gee, this house needs lots of work, I don't know." Or maybe they say you can stay in the house and rent it from them. But one way or the other, they will try to get you to sign your property over to them. They may even give you a token amount of money (\$1,000 or \$2,000). They may tell you that you can buy the house back when you get back on your feet or that they'll give you some money if they sell the house.

And so you sign their papers.

Now you no longer own the home. They may catch up the payments and make you feel like they just have your welfare in mind. But they rarely pay off your loan. That means you are still liable for that debt. They may just accept your rent payments and not pay the loan. You won't know that until a new notice is posted on your door. Or, they may seek to sell your house and pocket any equity there may be. Either way you now have no home and have lost any equity you may have had.

Please don't be that desperate, vulnerable person. Watch out for your friends, neighbors, moms and dads, and sisters and brothers. A wise person I know always says, "It is much easier to stay out of trouble than it is to get out of trouble."

There are many legitimate resources that can and will help you.

Dumpster Diving Harmless Recycling or Something Else?

You see a guy collecting pop cans from the dumpster at your apartment complex or in your neighborhood; no big deal, right?

Wrong. The removal of recycle or solid waste from a garbage pickup area is a violation of Hillsboro Municipal Code 6.08.020 and could come with a \$500 fine to parties outside of tenants or property owners who deposit trash or recycle.

Be ALERT - if you see someone removing items from your garbage who is:

(a) not a tenant, or not someone you recognize from the neighborhood, and may be wearing a backpack or carrying bags to collect items from the garbage; or

(b) on a bicycle, towing a cart; especially at night or in the early morning hours.

If you see either of these conditions, do not confront the person. Report the circumstances and a good description immediately to non-emergency dispatch at 503-629-011. After the fact, communicate with your neighbors and/or landlord about the suspicious activity.

Although some of these parties are only collecting pop cans or other discarded items; others are using this as an opportunity to steal personal information, or see how secure the property is. The collection of garbage may merely be a ruse to scope out cars in your apartment parking lot or neighborhood in search of more valuable items.

Many apartment complex owners have *trespass* agreements with Hillsboro Police. This document allows officers to exclude those who have no tie to the property and collect cans; but more importantly, non-tenants who illegally dispose of garbage which is a criminal offense under ORS 164.805.
